House Biographical Directory: Historical Research with the House Archives!

The House Archives Historical Biographical Directory provides biographical and bibliographical information about Representatives who served in the PA House. Currently, information on Members who served from 1875 to the present is available. We are currently researching Members who served between 1859 and 1874.

The information we gather on former Members includes their birth/death years and locations, education, military service, careers, and public offices held prior to House service, as well any jobs or public offices held afterwards. We also look for information on their families — particularly for those who have relatives that also held public office.

When researching, sources such as the Pennsylvania Manual or the House Legislative Journal can provide some basic information. However, to get a better picture of the lives and issues that were important to long-ago or hard-to-find Members, we often turn to reputable online resources. Here are a few tips about the sources we use to help you conduct your own research:

Ancestry.com & Genealogical Resources

Through using this popular genealogical website, we can find many useful pieces of information about former Members. Materials we often access include census records,

military service records, death certificates, marriage records, city directories, school yearbooks, and occasionally even family trees constructed by descendants of Members. These kinds of documents can lead us to information about Members' families, careers, and possible relocations.

Research Continued

Newspapers

Newspapers often provide the most compelling information about Members. Many of the "big moments" in anyone's life can often be found in local press, including weddings, birth announcements, graduations, and deaths. For Members, we can often find information on campaigning, noteworthy legislation, and issues that were of importance to them and their district.

Researching through newspapers no longer requires a trip to a local library. Many newspapers have been digitized and are available to view online. One website we utilize with great success is Newspapers.com, but other websites are available as well.

Make a call!

Occasionally, we find ourselves with gaps in our research — or little information at all on a former Member. In those cases, we often try calling a local historical society or library in their home district to provide us with some leads. Reaching out to a church or cemetery we know is associated with a Member can also sometimes lead to useful information.

Mrs. Ella Adams Is Summoned By Death Active Local Resident Dies Suddenly

Mrs. Ella Collier Adams, widow of Attorney John B. Adams, died suddenly in Uniontown Hospital, at 6:30 Thursday evening, September 14, 1944.

Long prominent in civic, religious and political circles, Mrs. Adams was one of the city's most widely known residents. She had attended meetings this week and her death is a distinct shock to the district

Born in Georges township, August 7, 1865, Mrs. Adams was a daughter of John B. and Anna Laidley Collier. She was a graduate of Beaver college.

A member of the Third Presbyterian church, she served as teacher of the Bethany Sunday school class. She was a member of Great Meadows Chapter, Daughters of American Revolution, Travel Club, Civic League and of the Board of Directors, Uniontown Library.

Mrs. Adams served two terms as a member of the State Legislature, and was the first woman to serve on the Republican county committee, acting as first vice chairman for 14 years. Prior to her marriage, she was employed in the Uniontown postoffice 15 years.

Surviving are one sister, Mrs. Margaret Eddy. Salem, O., and one brother, John J. Collier, Mt. Clemens, Mich. Three nieces and four nephews also survive.

Friends will be received in the home, 210 West Main street, after 7 o'clook tonight. Funeral arrangements in charge of A. D. Ferguson, are incomplete.


